SUBJECT: Update on the Proceedings of the Classification and Districting Committee

The Classification and Districting Committee for the 2018-2022 four-year time block held its eighth public meeting at the Oregon Athletic Directors Association (OADA) Conference in Sunriver on April 24, 2017 to receive testimony and review written communication thus far received.

The Committee initially met in a closed work session to review written correspondence received since the last meeting. Once the public meeting began, Classification and Districting Committee Chair Curt Shelley addressed those assembled and the group received testimony from 24 athletic directors representing all six classifications. The classifications had met for nearly two hours each the night before to discuss in detail where they stand at this point in the process and came prepared to present their input to the Committee. Here's what was presented:

1A – The main discussion point for 1A schools continues to center around the cutoff point between 1A and 2A, which has fluctuated between 89 and 95 during this process. There were 39 1A schools represented in the previous night's meeting and the 95 cutoff was favored by a 23-16 vote. Those in favor believe it's a better reflection of where the cutoff had been in previous time blocks, especially given the change to adjusting for SES made four years ago. There is also a belief that longtime, traditional 1A schools would be able to come back into the classification with the cutoff at 95. As a group, the 1A athletic directors believe that the cutoff should go no lower than 89. Those in favor of 89 as the cutoff recognize the issues that many 1A schools have in just fielding teams and the differences a greater disparity can create in size of schools.

2A – Athletic directors at the 2A level voted 19-7 in favor of maintaining a 6-classification system. Concerns were expressed about the negative impact on programs and schools that a move to a 5-classification system would have on their classification. Testimony focused on the difficulty of rolling back to a 5-classification system and their belief it would be unfair from a competitive balance viewpoint to bring in a number of larger schools. It was also mentioned that some schools would face longer travel in a 5-classification system. Proponents of a 6-classification approach referenced that it would cut down on travel for some schools in certain areas of the state and that concerns over special districts in various sports are better addressed in a 5-classification system.

3A – A 6-classification approach was favored by 3A athletic directors by a vote of 21-19. Specific issues this group mentioned were travel, budget, and competitive balance factors. There was significant discussion in their meeting the night before surrounding the criteria in place for schools petitioning to play down and this group's belief that the criteria needs to be adjusted/relaxed to address those schools that demonstrate a need to be moved. Additionally there was discussion that the criteria may need to look different depending on whether a 5-classification or 6-classification approach is used. Overall, they want to compete against similar looking schools with which they have things in common. There are concerns about public vs. private issues at this classification that are ongoing. It was also mentioned that many schools at this level travel quite a bit already and that isn't a huge issue when compared to competitive balance for their programs.

4A – This classification is perhaps most impacted by a possible move to a 5-classification system as it essentially splits their schools nearly in half. The 4A athletic directors voted 32-6 to keep a 6-classification system similar to how it looks currently for their schools. Like the 3A group, the 4A ADs believe that concerns from the smaller and, in some cases, less successful schools at their classification could be addressed with modifications to the criteria to play down rather than a wholesale change to a 5-classification approach. They believe that moving as few schools as possible in a 6-classification approach also lessens the overall impact on other classifications.

5A – Representatives speaking for the 5A athletic directors reported that this group voted 22-3 in favor of maintaining a 6-classification system. They contend that the 6-classification system isn't broken and, at most, needs a slight tweaking of G:\Committees\Classification & Districting\2018\20170424\20170424\20170424\update.doc

cutoff points moving forward. This group believes that competitive balance is covered in the committee's charge and they don't see competitive balance occurring in a 5-classification approach. While they would like to see more schools at their classification, it isn't an issue for them to have around 30 total schools. Those in favor of a 6-classification system believe it cuts down on travel for outlying schools without resorting a hybrid model, which they don't want.

6A – The 6A ADs didn't take a formal vote but are virtually unanimous in their support for a 5-classification system. Those testifying mentioned a lack of stability with leagues changing every four years and the toll that has taken on their schools. They believe that a 5-classification approach with more schools in the classification provides more flexibility with league placements to address competitive balance concerns among their schools. Many 6A schools believe the current 6-classification system is broken and that long-term stability is better addressed in a 5-classification approach. Travel concerns were discussed, including the economic and academic impact of traveling for schools with higher SES factors and that some schools have fewer students participating due to lengthy travel.

The Committee then adjourned to a closed work session to review and discuss the testimony and written correspondence.

As seen by the testimony of statewide athletic directors, there is a considerable divide among member schools as to which approach the Association should take moving forward. Proponents of a 5-classification approach, mainly 6A schools, point to the increased depth within classifications and the flexibility that allows when creating leagues that are competitive. Schools at lower classifications in favor of a 5-classification approach often point to decreased travel. Both support the long-term stability they believe a 5-classification approach provides for the Association as a whole. Those in favor of a 6-classification approach support maintaining the status quo in a system that is working well for them currently. Though 6-classification supporters recognize a need to tweak the current system given changing enrollments for some schools, they strongly believe that competitive balance for the most number of schools is best achieved with 6-classifications.

After lengthy discussion and review last Monday, the Committee believes the time has come to narrow their approach to one classification system as there is plenty of work still to be done with cutoff points, league alignments and school placements prior to the group finalizing their recommendations to the Executive Board and Delegate Assembly. They are aware that no matter which approach they choose, there will be schools that support that system and others that will be opposed.

While there is support from some Committee members for five classifications, the majority of the voting members of the committee are in favor of moving forward with a 6-classification approach. Based on testimony and written correspondence over the past several months, it's evident that a majority of schools believe that a 6-classification approach works best for the students, schools, and communities in our state. Discussions centered around the fact that the membership appears to be split, at best, on the different approaches and the overall belief that the membership doesn't appear ready to make the wholesale changes across the board that would result from a change to five classifications. Committee members look forward to continuing to work through the process to adjust cutoff points, league alignments and school placements to best meet their charge and address concerns from member schools. The Committee requests that all correspondence reference a six-classification approach from this point forward.

Since the Committee spent nearly their entire work session discussing which approach to take, they weren't able to spend time on the specifics of any one draft. Therefore, they are once again putting out Draft #15 – 6 Classification and seeking feedback on the cutoff points, league alignments and school placements. Please note that this is a draft proposal and is not a final recommendation. (see draft #15 attached)

Schools are reminded that per the OSAA Handbook (Article 6.2.4), June 1 is the deadline for schools submitting Petitions to Play Down (http://www.osaa.org/docs/forms/PetitiontoPlayDown.pdf). or Petitions to Play Up (http://www.osaa.org/docs/forms/PetitiontoPlayUp.pdf).

The Committee has discussed geographic exceptions for schools. At this time, the committee's goal is to create a system in which geographic exceptions are not used but they are willing to discuss those possibilities in specific instances as the process moves forward.

The next public meeting of the Classification and Districting Committee will be at 9am on Monday, May 22, 2017, at the Al Kader Shriners Headquarters (next to the OSAA Offices) in Wilsonville. The general format for the meeting will be for the committee to receive public testimony followed by a closed work session.

The Committee will meet throughout this school year and will make its final recommendations to the OSAA Executive Board at the October 16, 2017, Special Classification and Districting Meeting.
