

1		A Bill For National Firearm Security
2	BE IT ENAC	TED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
3	SECTION 1:	Firearm security will be implemented to prevent firearm incidents.
4	A physical fir	earm identification card for gun owners will be required.
5	SECTION 2:	The purchase of firearms will be allowed to all those 18 years and older.
6	SECTION 3:	A firearm identification card will require multiple steps to obtain it.
7	A firearm ide	ntification card will require that the following be passed and acknowledged:
8		a mental health check, criminal background check, firearm training course
9		must be completed, a written knowledge test about firearms, and a
10		practical firearm test using live firearms, all set forth and overseen by the
11		Department of Justice, Department of Homeland Security, Department of
12		Health and Human Services.
13	SECTION 3:	All firearms will be registered and all sales will require a seven day waiting
14		period before a purchased firearm can be transferred to the owner.
15	SECTION 4:	All firearms currently owned and in circulation will be required to be
16		registered or shall be confiscated.
17	SECTION 5:	Ownership and/or of sales of any unregistered firearms will be illegal.
18	subsection a	: Any illegal ownership of a firearm will result in a minimum two years in
19		prison and/or a \$1,000 fine for first time infraction, any sales of illegal
20		firearms will result in a minimum of a ten year imprisonment without parole
21		for first time infraction.
22	SECTION 6:	The US Government will provide a total of 50 billion dollars to fully
23		complete the initial implementation of this bill and 30 billion dollars
24		annually to maintain this bill.
25	SECTION 7:	This bill will go into effect after passage of bill. Full immersion of this bill
26		into law and society will be completed by January 1st, 2020.
27	SECTION 8:	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

1 2	A Bill to Increase CDC funding for New Diseases Abroad BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
3	SECTION 1. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention shall be given an
4	additional \$500 million annually towards researching and controlling new
5	diseases abroad within third world countries.
6	SECTION 2 . Researching shall be defined as investigating possible diseases that
7	originate from animals. Controlling shall be defined as actively preventing
8	any discovered diseases. New diseases abroad shall be defined as
9	foreign diseases outside of the United States.
10	SECTION 3 . The Center for Disease Control and Prevention shall oversee the
11	implementation of this bill.
12	SECTION 4. This Bill shall be enforced by January 1st, 2019.
13	SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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1		A Bill to Enact a Federal Carbon Tax
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3	BE IT ENAC	TED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
4	Section 1.	CO2 emissions shall be taxed at \$25 dollars per ton, and increase by two
5		percent above inflation annually. Emissions from personal vehicles, public
6		transportation and agriculture equipment shall be exempt through Fiscal
7		Year 2035.
8	Section 2.	A carbon tax shall be defined as a tax proportional to the consumption of
9		fossil fuels. Sequestered CO2 shall be exempt from the tax.
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11	Section 3.	The Environmental Protection Agency shall oversee implementation of this
12		bill.
13	SECTION 4.	This legislation shall go into effect October 1, 2018
14	Section 5.	Any sections of laws that would prevent implementation of this legislation
15		are hereby declared null and void.

1	A Bill to Protect Digital Data at the United States Border
2	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
3	SECTION 1. Governmental entities will no longer be able to access digital data
4	belonging to or in possession of a United States citizen at the border
5	without a warrant, and will no longer be able to deny a person's entry or
6	exit from the United States based on the person's refusal to provide
7	access to the contents of digital electronics.
8	SECTION 2. Governmental entity shall be defined as any branch, department, agency,
9	or official acting under state or federal law. Digital data shall be defined as
10	receiving data or access to electronic devices and all of their contents, and
11	all online credentials. Digital electronic shall be defined as any device that
12	has data and or connects to the internet.
13	SECTION 3. The United States Department of Justice and the United States Border
14	Patrol will oversee this implementation and compliance with this bill.
15	SECTION 4. This bill will be implemented 30 days after passage to ensure Border
16	Patrol officers are educated on the new system
17	SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

1		A Bill to Help Improve America's Infrastructure
2	BE IT ENACT	ED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
3	Section 1.	
4	A.	The U.S. ranks 25th in world rankings for infrastructure according to the World
5		Economic Forum's Global Competitiveness Report for 2012-2013.
6	B.	American infrastructure is falling apart, especially in major U.S. cities.
7	C.	The American Infrastructure Report Card from the American Society of Civil
8		Engineers (ASCE) gave America's infrastructure a D+ in 2017.
9	Section 2. Infr	astructure is the basic physical and organizational structures and facilities (e.g.,
10 11		buildings, roads, and power supplies) needed for the operation of a society or enterprise.
12	Section 3.	The Department of Transportation, Department of the Interior, Department of
13		Housing and Urban Development, Department of Labor, Department of Treasury,
14		and the Environmental Protection Agency shall oversee the implementation of
15		this bill.
16	A.	\$500 billion dollars shall be allocated for implementation.
17	В.	A 35% tax will be placed on the purchase of commercially sold gas to pay for the
18		implementation of this bill.
19	C.	Research will be started regarding the implementation of a National Mileage Tax
20		such as the one seen in Oregon.
21	D.	A committee will be made featuring representatives of the previously named
22		Departments as well as yet to be decided representatives of the private industry
23		to discuss how to go about future infrastructure plans.
24	E.	The Environmental Protection Agency will oversee the validity of all new projects
25		as well as the adherence of regulation therein.
26	F.	The funding each year shall be re-evaluated at the start of every fiscal year by
27		the Department of Treasury in association with Congress and The Committee on
28		Ways and Means.
29	Section 4.	This bill shall go into effect on January 1, 2023, or the next fiscal year after the
30		\$500 billion dollars is raised.
31	Section 5. All	laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

1	A Bill to Forbid Discrimination in Donation Funded Non-Profit Businesses
2	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
3	SECTION 1. Any non-profit business that receives 50% or more of their funding from
4	public donations must provide proof of distributing promised aid without
5	regard to race, sex, sexual orientation, gender orientation or religion.
6	SECTION 2. A nonprofit business is defined as a business or corporation receiving tax
7	exemption from the IRS according to the Internal Revenue Code (IRC).
8	SECTION 3. The IRS will be responsible for overseeing the enforcement and
9	authentication of the businesses in following the new guidelines.
10	A. A clause shall be added to the IRC stating the nondiscrimination requirement
11	and thus ensuring all new businesses looking to apply for nonprofit status will
12	be held accountable of inclusive actions.
13	SECTION 4. This bill will take effect as of January 1, 2019 upon passing.
14	SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

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1 2	A Bill to Legalize the Sale of Human Organs
3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
4	SECTION 1. The United States Federal Government will legalize the regulated sale of
5	human organs. Organs will be sold by donors only if it is their choice and
6	only if they pass a mental & physical health screening beforehand.
7	Donors can sell to approved hospitals only; there will be no organ sales by
8	the donor to a third party.
9	SECTION 2. Definitions:
10	 A. Sale is defined as the exchange of commodity for money.
11	B. Organ is defined as a healthy part of an organism that is typically self-
12	contained and has a specific vital function, such as the heart or liver.
13	C. Approved Hospitals will be those cleared by the Department of Health &
14	Human Services to properly retrieve, store and transplant the organs in
15	question.
16	SECTION 3. Regulated by the Department of Health and Human Services
17	SECTION 4. Effective January 1st 2020.
18	SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void

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1 2	Bill to Inspire The Construction of Lanes for Autonomous Vehicles
3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
4	SECTION 1. This bill shall provide 75% of the funding necessary to create designated
5	lanes for the exclusive use of autonomous vehicles on interstate highways
6	around high density metropolitan areas.
7	SECTION 2. An already existing lane can be designated to autonomous vehicles so
8	long as it meets the following conditions:
9	a. The lane is separated from the rest of traffic by a guard rail.
10	b. The designation does not significantly decrease the current traffic capacity of
11	the highway.
12	Otherwise, a new lane shall be created. This can be adjacent to the roadway or a
13	new construction entirely.
14	SECTION 3. Autonomous vehicles shall meet all standards concerning Intelligent
15	Transport Systems laid out by the International Organization for
16	Standardization in order to have access to the exclusive lane. The owner
17	of any vehicle that does not meet these standards found occupying the
18	autonomous lane is guilty of a traffic violation. The Department of
19	Transportation shall oversee the implementation of this bill of this bill,
20	permitting licenses to use the exclusive lane to the owners of autonomous
21	vehicles that meet the necessary standards listed above. Funding for this
22	bill will come from general revenues. However, the fees collected from the
23	licenses issued by the Department of Transportation will contribute to the
24	funding of this bill.
25	SECTION 4. This bill will take effect within five years of passage.
26	SECTION 5. Any laws in conflict with this bill will hereby be declared null and void.

1	A Bill to Prohibit a First-Use Nuclear Strike Absent a Declaration of War
2	by Congress
3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
4	SECTION 1. The President may not use the Armed Forces of the United States to
5	conduct a first-use nuclear strike unless such strike is conducted pursuant
6	to a declaration of war by Congress that expressly authorizes such strike.
7	SECTION 2. The term "first-use nuclear strike" will mean an attack using nuclear
8	weapons against an enemy without prior confirmation that the enemy in
9	question has already launched a nuclear strike against the United States
10	or an ally of the United States.
11	SECTION 3. The Department of Defense shall develop new and/or adapt its existing
12	nuclear weapons command and control procedures to implement and
13	enforce this law.
14	SECTION 4. The law shall take effective immediately upon signature by the President
15	or veto-override by the Congress.
16	SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
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1	A Bill for Justice Reinvestment
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3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
4	SECTION 1: The United States Federal Government will allocate billion dollars from the
5	Department of defense to a study in the Department of Justice to lower
6	recidivism rates
7	SECTION 2: Recidivism Rates shall be defined as: A measurement of the rate at which
8	offenders commit other crimes, either by arrest or conviction baselines,
9	after being released from incarceration.
10	SECTION 3: This bill will be overseen by Office of Managementthe budget will be
11	overseen by the Department of defense and the Department of Justice
12	SECTION 4: This bill will go into effect no later than the date of January 1st, 2019.
13	SECTION 5: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
